Dear Caucus Leaders:

Net neutrality is a critical racial justice issue. This is why the more than 50 undersigned groups are urging members of the Congressional Black, Hispanic, Asian Pacific, and Native American Caucuses to endorse the resolution of disapproval — sponsored by Rep. Mike Doyle — to repeal the Federal Communications Commission's decision to eliminate Net Neutrality rules. We also urge Caucus members to publicly support strong Title II open internet protections.

The Trump FCC voted in December to gut the Net Neutrality rules the Commission adopted in 2015 that prevented internet service providers, like AT&T, Comcast, and Verizon, from blocking, throttling and discriminating against online content. The Commission's vote clears the way for big broadband companies to block websites, slow down web traffic and censor online content.

This decision will change how the internet has always functioned and will harm the ability of communities of color to connect and communicate online.

Net neutrality has enabled people of color to speak for ourselves and tell our own stories and empower our communities without asking permission from broadband gatekeepers on whether our voices are worthy of being heard. We have also used the open internet to organize online and fight for the human rights and dignity of our people. It has enabled us to say #MeToo and no to mass deportation, mass incarceration, the Muslim ban and the Dakota access pipeline.

FCC Chair Ajit Pai's decision to kill net neutrality is part of the current agency's ongoing efforts to further the goals of the Trump Administration and push policies that target and punish the most vulnerable members of society.

Since taking the helm of the Commission last year, Chairman Pai has pursued this and other policies that wage war on the poor. For instance, Pai failed to defend the Obama FCC's policy to crack down on corrupt prison phone company practices that make it harder for people to communicate with their incarcerated loved ones, and has put forward a proposal to significantly dismantle the Lifeline program, which provides more affordable phone and internet service for families living well below the poverty line.

The first year of Chairman Pai's tenure has served as a wake up call. His agency's war on the poor is an effort to deny communities of color and low-income households the basic ability to access modern communication networks and prevent us from fully participating in society.

We urge members of the Caucuses that represent communities of color to denounce this assault on the communications rights of people of color by co-sponsoring the resolution of disapproval and overturning the FCC's decision to kill its Net Neutrality rules.
